COMMUNITY RESOURCE OFFICER

During the month of May, Community Resource Officer Reiter was involved in the following crime prevention and community relations activities:

Majority of the month was spent field training Officer Budlong and assisting patrol officers with various types of calls and incidents.

On Saturday the 9th, I assisted with the new hiring fitness testing at Monona Grove High School

On Tuesday the 12th, the annual bike rodeo was completed at Winnequah School. This year Monona Walmart made a donation to the program allowing for a bicycle, two bike helmets, and a safety kit to be given away.

On Wednesday the 20th, I completed a presentation at the Monona Senior Center on telephone scams.

On Sunday the 24th, the department fitness testing was completed at the high school

Several phone calls, e-mails, and conversations took place this month about the bike rodeo and upcoming National Night Out Event scheduled for Tuesday, August 4th.

OPERATIONS DIVISION

In May of 2015, the patrol division handled 29 vehicle crashes, which is down a few from last month's 35. Vehicle crashes are a significant part of a police officer's day. There were also 164 traffic warnings, 205 traffic citations, and 22 parking tickets issued. There were a total of 1,665 calls for service in May.

Training

K9 Sgt. Adam Nachreiner attended 24 hours of K9 training.

Officer Jared Wedig and Det. Matt Bomkamp attended an eight hour course on Use of Force Transition training.

Security Checks

Officers performed 280 security checks in the month of May. A security check is when an officer goes in to a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of, and this also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this is checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 49 retail theft cases in May up slightly from 41 cases in April. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In May we had 3 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 1.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents


There were no Use of Force incidents in May.

Safety Tip


Make sure you lock all your doors and windows when you leave your house, even for a short time, in order to make your house more secure from burglary.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On 05/07/15 at 8:16pm there was a crash worth talking about for a moment even though it occurred on second shift. This was a one car crash at the roundabout on South Towne Drive. This driver was distracted by garbage in her own car getting caught under her brake pedal. When she went to clear the garbage while moving and she hit the curb and a street light and flipped her car over. The huge concern with this incident was that the driver had two children in her car, ages 1 and 3. The 1 year old was in a car seat, but the three year old was not in a child safety seat. Everyone was injured, but thankfully not seriously. The driver was cited for not securing her child in a child restraint and for operating while suspended.



On 05/15/15 at 10:48am an officer was dispatched to a residence over a concern about a neighbor and his dog. Apparently both live next to one another and each has a dog. When the dogs go to the fence line, they fight. Ultimately the one neighbor is alleged to have poked the other neighbor's dog with a weed pulling tool, causing a puncture wound on the dog. That neighbor was issued a citation for mistreatment of animals.



On 05/27/15 at 7:03am an officer was dispatched for a check welfare on an individual stopped in the middle of the parking lot at 5217 Monona Drive, sleeping, and blocking the way for other cars. The responding officer found the driver passed out at the wheel, with a strong odor of marijuana coming from the car. The driver woke and it turned out he was not having a medical issue, rather he was just tired. The driver was on probation and was arrested for possession of 8.9 grams marijuana packaged in 15 individual pouches. The DA's office charged the male with possession with intent to deliver THC, a class I felony.

2nd Shift Monthly Report

Second shift was busy for the month of May. During this month we increased the amount of traffic stops. With the warmer weather we had 117 traffic stops. Plus three more stops that were drunk driving arrests. The warmer weather also brought an increase in Retail Thefts, 30 and Crashes 13. Officers on second shift also made 6 warrant arrests.



While gathering data for this month's report I noted that on second shift we handled several thefts of unattended items left in public places. For example a woman left her purse on the bar unattended for "only a minute". Another left a bag with her purse in it under her chair at an event. One person set their cell phone down "for just a minute." Although we may catch who stole the purse and its contents it is rare that the victim ever gets their belongings back. Never leave your valuable items unattended to include having a friend watch it. Another bad idea is placing your purse in the child seat area of a shopping cart. Again, it only takes seconds for someone to grab it or your wallet out of it while you have your back turned trying to find that item on the shelf.

3rd Shift Monthly Report

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 3 retail theft investigations and arrested 3 individuals who had active arrest warrants. The officers focused on traffic enforcement and made 86 traffic stops, 3 of which resulted in drunk driving arrests. Officers were also busy with several domestic and civil dispute calls throughout the month.

On May 2nd, 2015 at 2:35am, a vehicle was stopped for speeding 75 mph in a 55 mph zone on HWY 12 at South Towne Dr. When the officer made contact with the operator he detected the odor of intoxicants and requested the driver submit to Field Sobriety Tests. The tests were conducted which the suspect failed. The driver was arrested for 2nd offense OWI. The driver later submitted to a breath test where a reported value of .16 was obtained.

On May 6th, 2015 at 6:47am, officers responded to an apartment complex on Owen Rd for a disturbance. The investigation determined that a 16 year old male, physically assaulted his mother in the apartment by repeatedly punching her and breaking other property inside. The disturbance started over not wanting to go to school. During the altercation the 16 year old grabbed a knife and held it toward his mother threatening to kill her. The juvenile was taken into custody and transported to the juvenile reception center where he was charged with Disorderly Conduct While Armed, Criminal Damage to Property and Battery.

On May 7th, 2015 at 12:26am, Officers responded to Wal-Mart for a report of a Retail Theft suspect who was inside the store and wanted on 4 previous Retail Thefts, which he had fled from. Officers responded and arrested the suspect on the 4 open Retail Theft cases. The suspect was on Probation and a hold was placed on him. The suspect was charged for the retail thefts and released to the Dane Co Jail on the hold.

May 15th, 2015 at 2:24 am, an officer stopped a vehicle for speeding 88 mph in 55 mph zone on HWY 12 at South Towne Dr. The officer noted the odor of intoxicants coming from the driver and conducted SFST. The suspect failed the tests and was arrested for OWI 1st. A breath test later showed a B.A.C. of .10.

May 16th, 2015 at 5:45 am, an officer was conducting routine patrol and came up behind a truck that was stopped at the traffic control signal of E/B HWY 12 Off-ramp at South Towne Dr. The officer noted a vehicle drive around the truck which had now sat through an entire cycle of traffic control signals. The officer made contact with the driver who was asleep behind the wheel. After waking him they detected the odor of intoxicants coming from him. The officer requested the driver to submit to SFST. The suspect failed the tests and was arrested for OWI 2nd offense.

INVESTIGATIVE DIVISION

Detective Unit

Members of the Investigative Unit were assigned to, or assisted with, 16 incidents.

Current Investigations

MO15-01454 – ID Theft

The department was contacted by UW Credit Union reporting that several of their customers had been victims of identity theft in the form of a suspect using cloned credit cards around the Madison area. A few of these cloned credit cards were used in Monona. Detectives obtained video from area stores documenting these fraudulent purchases and a suspect was developed. Detectives are working with other departments and many charges will be filed on this suspect.

SEVERAL CASES – Forgery

There have been several recent reports of people passing fake \$20 and \$50 bills. The detectives worked with local agencies and have identified one person so far that passed a fake \$50 bill at a local gas station.

MO15-00236 – Sexual Assault

This case involved two co-workers at a local business. After a lengthy investigation and much evidence sent to and analyzed by the crime lab, charges will be forwarded to the DA's Office on the suspect.

MO15-02232 – Theft, ID Theft, & Forgery

A woman had her purse stolen from a local bar. After patrol took the report it was turned over to detectives. It was learned that three people were involved in this crime. One person took the purse, and two others after the fact used the victim's credit cards and forged stolen checks. Detectives identified all three suspects, and all three are being charged criminally.

MO15-02609 – Retail Theft

Two women attempted to steal about \$1,500 of baby formula from a local store. When approached by store security, they fled and the store maintained their property. Detectives have identified one of the suspects and charges are pending.

MO15-01937/Credit Card Fraud

A Monona resident reported their credit card was used on Amazon to make an unauthorized purchase. It is unknown if the suspect was known to the victim. After inquiring with Amazon, it was determined the merchandise was sent to a person in Miami, Florida.

MO15-02316/Weapons Offense

It was reported that a suspect, who was openly carrying a handgun in a holster, pulled the handgun on another person during an argument. The victim also reported being threatened by the suspect. After investigating the incident, no evidence was found to substantiate the report and it was discovered the victim had a motive to potentially fabricate the story.

MO15-02678/Theft

A purse was stolen from a vehicle parked in the lot of a local tavern. Two of the three suspects have been identified. The investigation is ongoing.

MO15-02695/Theft

A cellular phone was stolen from inside a local tavern. The theft was not captured on video surveillance. There are currently no known suspects or leads in this incident.

School Resource Officer

I was called to MG21 Charter School for a student that staff thought was under the influence of marijuana. School staff told me that the student was fine in the morning but was acting different after returning from lunch. School staff said the student was currently lying on a couch and was unable to do much. A teacher escorted the student to her office. As soon as the student saw me he turned and began walking towards the bathroom. The student said he needed to use the bathroom. I told the student I needed to talk to him first. While speaking with the student it did appear he was under the influence of marijuana. The student denied using any illegal substances or having any in his possession. The student, however, said he would not give me permission to search him. I requested the Associate Principal for MG21 respond. The AP spoke with school staff and the student. The AP believed the student was under the influence of an illegal substance and requested I search him. I located a prescription pill bottle containing marijuana and a glass pipe containing burnt marijuana on the student. I issued the student municipal citations for possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia. The student had several other AODA violations in the past year. Because of this the student's enrollment at MG21 was terminated and he was sent back to MGHS.

Two Monona Grove High School students left school at the start of the day after they pulled a fire alarm. The school notified the parents of the missing students. One of the student's mothers checked her home and found her son at home. The mother saw the son had printed out directions to Detroit. The mother said her son told her they were going to Detroit and ran out of the house. Officers checked the area for the two missing students and eventually received information from a teacher at MGHS who spotted them walking on Cottage Grove Road near Stoughton Road. We responded to the area and located the students. One of the students had a large backpack with him and told me he had a gun and knife in the backpack. The student was taken into custody and an airsoft pistol and folding knife were found in the backpack. The student advised they were trying to get to Detroit and believed they needed the weapons for protection when they got there. We transported the students to the police department. I issued the one student a municipal citation for carrying a concealed weapon. We contacted the student's parents and requested they come to the police department to pick up their sons.

I was called to MG21 for another student that staff believed was under the influence of marijuana. The teacher questioned the student and she admitted to smoking marijuana. The student had a baggy of marijuana and a pipe in her possession. I issued the student municipal citations for possession of marijuana and possession of drug paraphernalia. This student also had several prior AODA violations in the past year and was removed from the program.

I went to Glacial Drumlin School to assist with their Fun Run/Walk event. After the event a fight broke out between two 8th grade students outside the school. Staff separated the students and escorted them to the office. I spoke with the students involved and other students that had witnessed the incident. One of the students involved in the fight was wearing a blue colored bandana. The other student involved asked this student why he

was wearing it and if it was gang affiliated. The second student took the bandana off the first student's head and threw it. The first student then threw a cup of ice cream at the second student. The second student picked it up and threw it back. The two students then began punching each other. The second student picked up the first student and slammed him to the ground. School staff then came over and separated them. I issued both students municipal citations for disorderly conduct. The students also received school consequences.

Also in May I worked the Prom dance at the Monona Grove High School; I assisted with the Bike Rodeo at Winnequah School; I helped out with the Walking for Water activity performed by the 7th grade social studies classes at Glacial Drumlin School; and I attended in-service training at the Madison Police Department Training Center.

Clerk of Courts

During the month of May, 304 traffic, municipal ordinance and parking citations were issued. In addition there were 164 warnings issued for various traffic offenses. Sixteen adults were also referred to the Dane County District Attorney's Office for criminal charges.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center dispatches Police, Fire, and EMS, answers routine phone calls from citizens seeking information or wanting police assistance, processes citation payments, prepares and submits accident reports to the State of Wisconsin, files law enforcement related paperwork, and performs many other routine daily duties.

During the month of May, Dispatchers handled 1,665 calls for service. Of these calls for service, 119 calls came in on the 911 lines. Many of the calls for service are converted into incidents which require a report and additional paperwork. On average, each incident, consumes about 1.5 hours of the Dispatcher's time.
