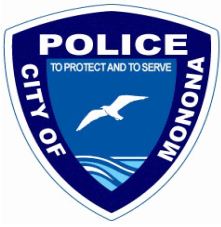

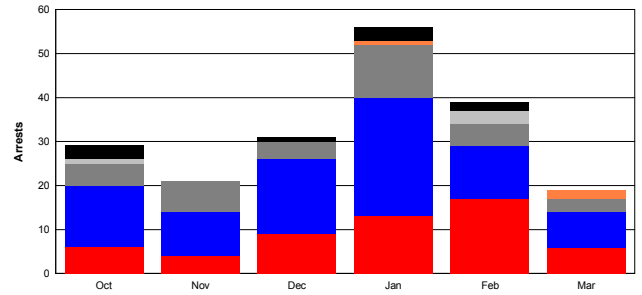

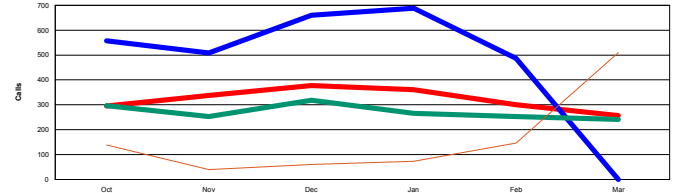
Arrests by Month

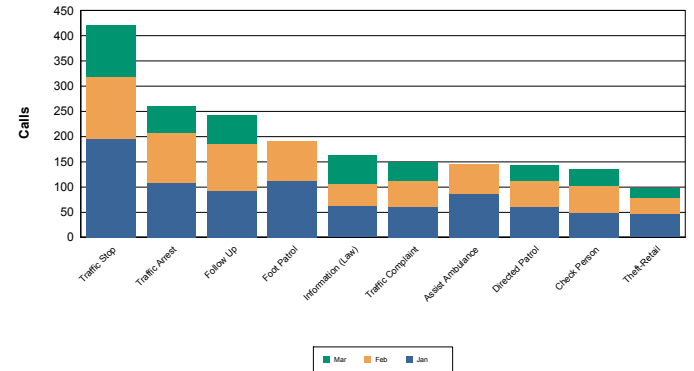

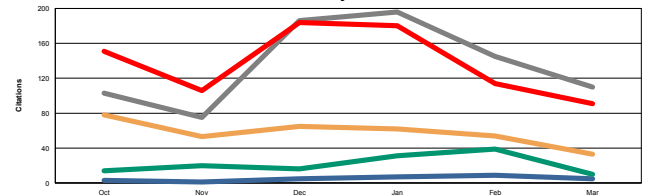

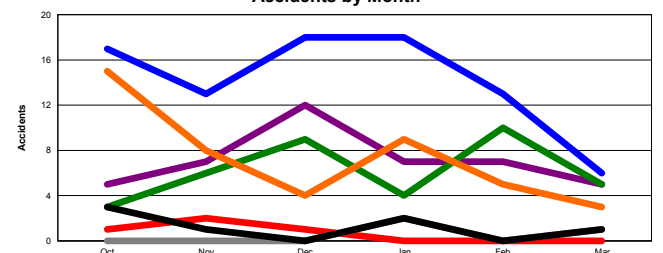

OPERATIONS DIVISION

In March of 2020, the Operations Division handled 21 vehicle crashes, issued 91 traffic warnings, 110 traffic citations, and 10 parking tickets. The total for number of calls for service in March was 1,009.

Training

All officers attended an 8-hour Firearms and DAAT In-Service training with our training consortium partners.

All other March training was cancelled due to COVID-19 concerns.

Speed Trailer

Security Checks

Officers performed 82 security checks in the month of March. A security check is when an officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 19 retail theft cases in March, down several from the 31 cases in February. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In March we had 14 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 3.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On March 2, 2020 at 3:08 p.m. a Monona Officer attempted to stop a car that was recklessly driving and fleeing from a deputy. The vehicle refused to stop and struck two sets of spikes along the beltline highway. Ultimately, the driver crashed into a cement barrier and all occupants fled on foot. Several were located and arrested. The Dane County Sheriff's Department handled charges. (MO20-02610)

On March 8, 2020 at 4:04 p.m. an officer responded for a retail theft. The suspect had fled from loss prevention. The suspect ran into the area of Poms Tire. K9 Miya was able to locate the male subject hiding in some large tractor tires outside of Poms. A second officer held the suspect at Taser point until he could be handcuffed. The suspect was cited for Retail Theft and Obstructing. (MO20-02935)

On March 9, 2020 at 2:39 a.m. an officer located two stolen vehicles, traveling together, towards Monona at 115 MPH in a 55 MPH zone without headlights on. A traffic stop was attempted, but the cars fled onto the Beltline. Both vehicles avoided spike strips and the Monona Officer terminated the pursuit. (MO20-02954)

On March 11, 2020 at 12:28 a.m. a Monona Officer heard that a white car was stolen earlier in the evening from Fitchburg and that it was observed traveling approximately 100 MPH on the beltline. The officer went to investigate and observed the vehicle run a red light. A traffic stop was attempted and the driver attempted to flee. Spikes were requested but as the vehicle approached where the spikes were set, the driver lost control and struck the median barrier. The driver and two occupants were taken out at gun point. All three occupants were juveniles, and all three were arrested and taken to the Juvenile Reception Center. (MO20-03063)

On March 14, 2020 at 8:17 p.m. an officer observed a seatbelt violation. The officer then ran the vehicle plate, which came back to a revoked driver with IID restrictions. A traffic stop was attempted, but the driver refused to stop. The driver turned down a dead end and the Officer was able to spot light the driver as he attempted to drive away, making a positive ID. The driver continued to not stop and pulled into an apartment building lot and ran from the car into an apartment. The neighbor stepped out and verified the suspect just entered next door as he knew he lived there with his girlfriend. The suspect was arrested for Felony Eluding, Resisting Arrest and cited for Failure to Wear a Seatbelt. (MO20-03233)

On March 19, 2020 at 3:48 a.m. an officer heard the Town of Madison pursuing a reckless driver, which had been eluding officers all evening. As the suspect headed towards Monona, they drove head-on in the wrong lane at our officer. The Monona Officer swerved to the right and the suspect then almost rammed the Fitchburg squad which was behind him. As the pursuit began, the suspect ran over spikes and lost a tire. As the vehicle continued to flee, the driver lost control and jumped a curb and got stuck. The 17-year-old female driver surrendered and was arrested for Felony Eluding and Recklessly Endangering Safety. (MO20-03350)

On March 22, 2020 at 1:23 a.m. an officer heard a Dane County Deputy call out a stolen vehicle over the radio and that it was heading towards Monona on Broadway at a high rate of speed. The suspect ran a red light and rapidly accelerated away even before a Monona Officer made the traffic stop attempt. A pursuit was attempted but the vehicle fled quite recklessly so the officer terminated the pursuit. (MO20-03409)

On March 23, 2020 at 2:18 a.m. an officer heard a Dane County Deputy call out a stolen vehicle pursuit and that the vehicle was heading towards McFarland. McFarland PD was able to spike the vehicle. As the car continued after hitting the spikes, the deputy requested additional units to assist. The suspect then stopped and three males fled from the car. A perimeter was set up, and a K9 track led to the apprehension of all three suspects. Monona Officers had handguns pointed at a male hiding in a dumpster until he exited with no weapons present. All charges were handled by the Dane County Deputy. (MO20-03477)

Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in March.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On March 23, 2020 at 1:15 p.m. a work crew on the beltline discovered a gun tossed on the side of the road. Upon closer inspection the officer observed that it was in fact a realistic looking Co2 powered BB gun. The gun was taken to the Monona Police Department and was destroyed. (MO20-03461)



On March 15, 2020 at 12:46 p.m. a resident observed damage to their vehicle, which was parked on the street. A trail of debris led to a damaged car in a nearby parking lot. Next to the driver door of the suspect car was some vomit. The owner of the suspect car was issued a citation for Owner's Liability in a hit and run accident.

2nd Shift

The Monona Police Department Second Shift Officers conducted 56 traffic stops, handled 12 retail thefts, and 7 accidents during the month of March. One OWI arrest was made.

The following are some of the cases second shift handled this month.

Second shift officers responded to more disturbances than normal in the month of March. The disturbances ranged from arguments at retail businesses to arguments at homes.

Monona Officers also investigated suspicious vehicles/people. Two of which resulted in a drug investigation. In those cases, the suspects were arrested for possession of Drug Paraphernalia and Possession of Suspected Heroin.

During these strange times we are continuing to provide 24 hour police services for everyone in Monona.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 1 retail theft, 7 business alarms, and arrested 4 individuals with active arrest warrants while responding to several disturbance calls during the month of March. Officers made 72 traffic stops resulting in 5 OWI arrests. Of those 75 traffic stops, 48 were given warnings, while 27 were issued citations.

On March 1, 2020 at 1:20 a.m., an officer attempted to initiate a traffic stop on a vehicle for reckless driving that had just eluded a Dane County Deputy. The officer engaged in a vehicle pursuit and a successful stop stick deployment was conducted by the Town of Madison. The vehicle came to a stop after the tires deflated and the operator lost control of the car. The operator, along with a passenger in the vehicle, were taken into custody.

On March 2, 2020 at 11:45 p.m., a traffic stop was conducted on a vehicle that was deviating from its lane of traffic. The officer attempted to make a traffic stop, but before coming to a stop, the vehicle failed to pull over for 2.3 miles. The operator of the vehicle was arrested for OWI 2nd offense, with a B.A.C. of .38 g/210 L.

On March 7, 2020 at 3:48 a.m., officers responded to a fight in progress on HWY 12 near South Towne Drive. The investigation determined that while the operator was driving down the highway, an intoxicated passenger started to punch the driver. The vehicle pulled over where the physical altercation continued outside the vehicle. The passenger was arrested and taken to the Dane County Jail for Battery charges.

On March 10, 2020 at 12:45 a.m., an officer was traveling on HWY 12, in a fully marked patrol unit when a vehicle passed the officer traveling at speeds of 85-90 MPH. The officer made a traffic stop on the vehicle. The operator was arrested for OWI 1st offense, and refused a breath test. A Preliminary Breath Test determined the operator had a B.A.C. of .21 g/210L.

On March 11, 2020 at 12:28 a.m., an officer observed a stolen vehicle traveling at 95-100 mph westbound on HWY 12 at South Towne Drive. The officer attempted to stop the vehicle but it attempted to elude the officer. After a short pursuit, the vehicle lost control and spun out of the beltline and crashed into the median barrier. The 14-year-old driver and two 15-year-old passengers were taken into custody. All were transported to JRC on operating a motor vehicle without owner's consent charges.

On March 22, 2020 at 11:23 p.m., an officer observed a white pickup truck traveling eastbound on Broadway strike a traffic control signal at Frazier Avenue, knocking it over almost striking the patrol car. The vehicle fled and officers located the vehicle in a nearby apartment complex parking lot. The operator was arrested for OWI 2nd offense, with a B.A.C. of .17 g/210 L.

Current Investigations

MO20-01880 – THEFT

Detectives are currently working a case where a resident was scammed out of money online while attempting to purchase Milwaukee Bucks tickets.

MO20-03417 - BURGLARY

We were hit with a string of five business burglaries along Monona Drive in one night by one suspect. They were forced entry style burglaries and the target was clearly money only. Detectives worked this case and were able to identify who they believed committed the burglary spree, however there is not yet enough evidence to charge the suspect.



MO20-03619 – SEXUAL ASSAULT

A juvenile female gave birth to a healthy child. This investigation is in its early stages, but it appears the baby was a result of consensual sex with a peer. Pending.

School Resource Officer

March 2020 only consisted of 10 school days due to the Covid-19 outbreak and Governor Evers mandating school closures. I handled 14 cases total while school was in session. 13 cases at the Monona Grove High School, 1 case at the Monona Grove School District Office and 0 cases at Winnequah Elementary School. I issued 1 citation for Habitual Truancy and 1 citation for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

On March 5, 2020, a high school student parked very close to another vehicle in the residential neighborhood. After school there was a verbal confrontation between the students. Eventually a student pounded his fist on the hood of the other student's vehicle causing a significant dent. At the request of the victim's parent, restitution was paid and no citations were issued.

On March 6, 2020, I was walking through the commons before school and noted a strong odor of what I believed to be marijuana coming from a group of students. I mentioned it to the associate principal, but we could not initially determine which of the students may have been in possession. Shortly thereafter, a gym teacher located a baggy in the trash, in the gym. The baggy contained a glass marijuana pipe. I watched the camera feed to discover a student threw the baggy in the trash before the associate principal contacted her. The student was cited for Possession of Drug Paraphernalia.

On March 11, 2020, I attended parent teacher conferences at the high school where I had a table displaying different vaping devices and information packets to assist in educating parents. Numerous parents stopped by to talk about current nicotine/tobacco/THC trends and what I was seeing in the school.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

During the month of March, the Monona Police issued numerous traffic citations, municipal ordinance (non-traffic) citations, parking citations and warnings. In addition, there were many referrals for charges. See the detail below.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour of the Dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. Once completed these forms and reports are reviewed by the Investigations Lieutenant before submitting them to the DA's Office. Each of these submissions is reviewed for referral to the Dane County Community Restorative Court (CRC). CRC is a program to address youthful offenders, age 17 – 25, with little or no Criminal History in a restorative justice model as an alternative to formal criminal charges. The CRC Referrals line above shows the number of Adult Arrests & Referrals who qualified to participate in CRC. Offenders who fail to complete CRC are referred back to the DA's Office for formal charging.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of March, Dispatchers handled 1,009 calls for service. Most of these calls for service were received on the non-emergency lines, via personal reporting at the Police Department, transfers from the Dane County Communications Center or as self-initiated calls directly from Monona Officers.
