OPERATIONS DIVISION

In July of 2017, the Operations Division handled 23 vehicle crashes and issued 210 traffic warnings, 422 traffic citations, and 44 parking tickets. Our calls total for July was 1,902 calls for service.

Training

All Officers attended an 8 hour In-Service Training which included DAAT, Firearms, and a presentation on PTSD.

Lt. Wiegel attended an Emergency Management table top exercise on July 31st, 2017 from 1pm-4pm regarding disaster planning.

Security Checks

Officers performed 289 security checks in the month of July. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 28 retail theft cases in July, down a couple from the 34 cases in June. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In July we had 12 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 7.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On July 7th at 12:50am an officer was running radar on the beltline and observed a car traveling 99 MPH in a 55 MPH zone. The driver exited towards Monona Drive then accelerated back onto the beltline. The Officer terminated the pursuit when speeds became excessive. The Officer was unable to obtain the license plate.

Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in July.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On July 12th at 9:06am Officers were dispatched to a 5 vehicle crash on the Beltline. A truck was following too closely when traffic came to a stop. The driver stuck two vehicles pushing those into two additional vehicles, which included a Dane County Deputy's squad car. Thankfully no one was seriously injured. (MO17-04615)



On July 17th at 12:36pm Officers were dispatched to Shopko for a retail theft. A male fled from the loss prevention employee and then for a short time, fled from the Officer. Eventually the male circled back to the parking lot and surrendered. The suspect was charged with Operating while Suspended \$124, Failure to obey a traffic Officer \$98.80, and Retail Theft \$313. The male had attempted to steal \$68 worth of merchandise. (MO17-04787)

2nd Shift

During the month of July, 2nd Shift Officers conducted 259 traffic stops, had 3 OWI arrests, handled 9 Retail Thefts, 16 crashes, and made 4 warrant arrests.

Second shift continues to be busy this summer. Officers are working hard to enforce traffic laws in the City Of Monona and trying to focus on citizens' complaints of traffic. Some of those areas included Winnequah Road, Bridge Road, Frostwoods Road and Monona Drive. Here are some of the cases we handled.

On July 1st Officers were dispatched to the Walmart underground parking for a man who threatened another with a gun. Officers learned that this was an argument between two males living out of their vehicles in the underground lot and no gun was ever displayed. The parties were told to leave. As Officers cleared from the scene one of the men slashed the tires of the others vehicle flattening all four tires. He then fled in his vehicle.

On July 4th Officers had two separate reports of child neglect. One case occurred at 2500 Royal Avenue where a witness called saying a woman physically struck a child several times who was in the back seat of the car. The suspect then got into the vehicle and fled. The second was at the Dream Park where a 20 month old child was found wandering the festival grounds alone. The parent contacted the police an hour after we had custody of the child. In both cases Child Protective Services was notified.

On July 11th and 20th Officers were conducting drug surveillance in the Walmart area. On both days arrests were made in relation to Heroin possession, and drug paraphilia.

On July 29th Officers were dispatched to 2500 Royal Avenue for a disturbance. Upon arrival Officers learned that a customer had become upset because the clerk was not ringing up a customer. That customer then threw a temper tantrum and began throwing candy bars on the floor. The customer also was yelling and during this outburst had knocked a shake out of another customer's hand. The suspect, who was 32 years old, was cited and told to leave.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 7 retail thefts and responded to several disturbance calls during the month of July. Officers made 205 traffic stops resulting in 10 OWI arrests.

On July 1st, at 2:58 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for speeding, 71 mph in a 55 mph zone. The operator was arrested for 1st offense OWI with a B.A.C. of .15g/210L. The suspect in this case had been arrested for OWI 1st 2 weeks prior to this arrest but hasn't been convicted of that violation yet.

On July 8th, at 1:56 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for speeding, 83 mph in a 55 mph zone. The operator was arrested for 3rd offense, OWI, with blood results pending. A preliminary breath test showed a B.A.C. of .15g/210L.

On July 9th, at 12:53 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for speeding, 73 mph in a 40 mph zone. The operator was arrested for 2nd offense OWI and refused to submit to an evidentiary chemical test of his breath. A preliminary breath test showed a B.A.C. of .21 g/210L. The operator was also cited for operating after revocation and speed.

On July 15th, at 11:30 p.m. officers responded to 3837 Monona Drive for an unknown male trying to get into their residence. Officers arrived on scene and arrested an intoxicated male, who had a B.A.C .282 g/210L for Disorderly Conduct and Criminal Damage to Property. The suspect was also out on parole for 5th offense drunk driving. It was confirmed the suspect didn't have any ties to the area or residence.

On July 20th, between the hours of 12:30 a.m. to 3:15 a.m. officers responded to two separate domestic disturbances where arrests were made. One of the individuals arrested for domestic was also arrested for OWI. During these domestic incidents an officer located 2 suspects in an identity theft case where the detective division had probable cause to arrest them. They were taken to the Dane Co Jail.

On July 29th, officers responded to a single vehicle accident on Monona Drive and Coldspring Avenue. The suspect had fled from his vehicle but was later located and arrested for OWI 2nd offense with blood results pending. A preliminary breath test showed the suspect had a B.A.C. of .20 g/210L and also admitted to the use of cocaine.

Current Investigations

MO17-03660 – ARMED ROBBERY

An armed robbery was reported at a local business. Detectives worked this case, and other related cases with Madison PD. Two suspects were arrested and subsequently confessed to multiple crimes. The two subjects were charged with multiple felonies, including armed robbery, false imprisonment, and felony murder, in reference to an MPD case.

MO17-02607 – ID THEFT

A resident had someone use her phone number to post a harassing/damaging personal ad on a popular website. Detectives served the website with a search warrant and are awaiting a response in an attempt to identify the suspect. *UPDATE* - A suspect has been identified as a result of the search warrant and charges have been filed by the Dane County District Attorney's Office.

MO17-04753 – FRAUD

A person had their credit card stolen and used at a local store. Video surveillance showed the suspects. The Detective unit utilized the Wisconsin Crime Alert Network to send the photos to other law-enforcement agencies and identities of suspects were developed. The investigation is still open.

MO17-04881 – DRUG INVESTIGATION

Monona Detectives and Patrol conducted proactive drug enforcement during a regularly scheduled workday. Detective's witnessed drug activity and made contact with two parties who were both arrested for felony heroin charges.

MO17-04404 – CHILD NEGLECT

While working the beer tent area during the 4th of July festival, a detective was notified that a person found a lost child. She was a 20 month old female toddler that could not yet talk. The person who found the girl reported she had been with her for about an hour trying to find parents before contacting police. The detective had custody of the child for another 20 minutes before the mother called contacted police. There were no charges filed, however, the case was sent to Child Protective Services for possible action and or documentation.

MO17-04995 – ASSIST OTHER AGENCY

A Monona Detective assisted the McFarland Police Department with several suspects who were doing Craigslist scams. They would meet people selling expensive used cellular phones in McFarland. Once the suspects get the phones in their hands, they take off running with the phones. With all of the suspects doing this from the same group, two of the suspects are now in custody over a three day timespan.



MO17-04606 – DRUG INVESTIGATION

Monona detectives conducted proactive drug surveillance in the parking lot of Walmart. They observed a transaction from subjects between two vehicles and law enforcement made contact with the occupants of both vehicles as the occupants appeared to prepare to inject probable heroin. One of the vehicles had two young parents who had a 7 month old child in the vehicle. Both parents were arrested and the child was turned over to Child Protective Services.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

During the month of July, the Monona Police issued numerous traffic citations, municipal ordinance (non-traffic) citations, parking citations and warnings. In addition there were many referrals for charges. See the detail below.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour and a half of the dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. In addition, Police staff must follow up by going to the DA's office to sign probable cause forms, as well as, review and electronically sign complaints to ensure the subjects are properly charged or held on charges.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers 911 and business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center and a pre-alert is sent by the Monona Communications Center to Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center dispatches Police to all emergency and non-emergency calls, tracking the calls for service and officer response times. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance issues. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of July, Dispatchers handled 1,946 calls for service. These calls were derived from 143 calls which came in on the 911 lines with the remaining calls coming in on the non-emergency lines or directly from Monona Officers.
