OPERATIONS DIVISION

In December of 2017, the Operations Division handled 38 vehicle crashes and issued 117 traffic warnings, 182 traffic citations, and 26 parking tickets. Our calls total for December was 1,073 calls for service.

Security Checks

Officers performed 118 security checks in the month of December. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 25 retail theft cases in December, up quite a few from the 16 cases in November. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In December we had 8 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 18.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On December 8th at 12:44am an Officer went to stop a suspicious vehicle leaving a closed business lot and the driver fled at high speeds. The Officer terminated the pursuit per policy but checked the surrounding area in the event the suspect crashed. The Officer located the car abandoned nearby. The driver left his iPhone and a backpack behind.

The owner of those items is on probation. The probation agent put out a warrant for the male, but believed he may have fled to Chicago.

Citizen Complaints

There was one citizen complaint in December. A woman sent in a letter upset about how a crash was handled 15 months ago, in September of 2016. The woman had been checking CCAP for the last year and never saw any citations for the suspended driver, so she suspected the Officer was friends with the driver and somehow voided the citations listed in the crash report. We notified the complainant that CCAP is for Circuit Court Offenses and our citations are processed through Municipal Court. We verified the Officer issued three citations for violations of the law regarding this incident, and the driver was found guilty on all three counts.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On December 1st at 1:58pm an Officer was dispatched to McDonalds South for a report of a laptop computer stolen off a table. The victim put the computer down, ordered food and upon returning to the table, the computer was gone. The next day the Officer went to the store to pick up a copy of the surveillance video, and the suspect, still dressed in the same exact clothing, entered the McDonalds. The suspect confessed and the computer was in his car. The male was out on Parole, and was cited for theft.

On December 1st at 2:24pm an Officer was working with our Detectives on drug surveillance in the parking lot of Pier 37. The Officer observed some short term contact between two people and Officers were able to make traffic stops on both of the vehicles when they left. The investigation led to 25 ecstasy pills, 1gram of cocaine and \$809 in cash. One subject was arrested for possession of cocaine and taken to jail on 3 outstanding warrants, the other subject was arrested for possession of ecstasy and issued a citation for operating while revoked.

2nd Shift

During the month of December, the second shift conducted 113 traffic stops. We also handled 8 Retail Thefts, 26 crashes and had 4 OWI arrests.

The following are some of the cases second shift handled this month.

On December 8th Officers were dispatched to the area of Monona Pass for a possible gun shot. The Police Department received one call about possibly one shot being fired. Officers checked the area and did not locate anything. On December 9th a resident on Pheasant Hill called to say they located several empty shell casings in the roadway. Officers responded. In speaking to the residents in the neighborhood it was discovered that numerous people heard the shots but no one called. The casings were collected. No injuries or damage was discovered or reported.

On December 18th Officers responded to the 2100 block of West Broadway for a domestic disturbance. A male suspect had blocked the vehicle of his ex-girlfriend in and busted out her window. The suspect then fled in a vehicle and struck another vehicle causing a hit and run accident. Officers searched the area and were unable to locate the suspect. Later that evening the suspect was reported to be at a residence in the City of Madison causing another disturbance. Monona Officers assisted Madison. The suspect fled the residence on foot but was apprehended a short time later by Monona Police. He was transported to Jail.

On December 30th Monona Officers responded to the 5800 block of Anthony place for a subject with a gun. Mutual aid was requested and McFarland Police responded to assist. A perimeter was established and contact was made with the suspect. Monona Police were able to take the suspect into custody without incident. The suspect was upset because when he arrived home it appeared that someone had attempted to break in to his residence. The suspect had armed himself with a lever action rifle and checked his residence. The suspect has been charged.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 5 Retail Thefts, 18 Alarm calls and responded to several disturbance calls during the month of December. Officers made 82 traffic stops resulting in 2 OWI arrest.

The following are some of the cases third shift handled this month.

On December 2nd, 2017 at 2:07 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for speeding, 83 mph in a 55 mph zone, on Hwy 12. The operator of the vehicle was arrested for felony OWI 4th offense with blood results pending. A preliminary breath test showed a B.A.C. of .22g/210L. The suspect was taken to the Dane Co Jail on a probation hold and the new OWI charge.

On December 6th, 2017 at 2:11 a.m. a vehicle was stopped displaying unauthorized registration plates. The vehicle however, failed to stop after the officer was behind it with their lights and siren activated. The vehicles traveled in this manner for 3 minutes before it came to a stop in Sheraton Hotel parking lot. The operator was arrested for OWI 1st offense, with a BAC of .12 g/210L. The suspect also had an active arrest warrant out for him and was transported to the Dane Co Jail.

On December 12th, 2017 at 11:35 p.m. a vehicle was stopped for the registered owner not having a valid driver's license. During the investigation the officer could smell burnt marijuana coming from the vehicle. A search of the vehicle was conducted where the officer located the burnt marijuana blunt in the ashtray along with 4 individual baggies of cocaine and miscellaneous scheduled narcotics in the child safety seat. The operator was taken to the Dane Co Jail.

Community Resource Officer

During the month of December, Community Resource Officer Reiter was involved in the following crime prevention and community relations activities:

I assisted the detective division with a drug investigation. During this investigation several subjects were arrested for selling and buying of drugs.

Each year the Monona Police Department along with several other Dane County Law Enforcement Agencies participate in Shop with A Cop. The program works with our school district to select children who are less fortunate and doing well in school. The children are paired up with police officers for the day and eat breakfast, shop, wrap gifts, visit with Santa and Bucky Badger, and each lunch! All funds are raised from donations from the communities.



One of the selected kids from shop with a cop was unable to attend the event. After making arrangements with the child's mother Officer Wedig and I were able to take this child shopping and out to dinner.

Monona State Bank requested an informal talk with staff reference bank robberies. Staff members were provided tips to use during and after a bank robbery. Staff was also informed how the police department will respond to bank robberies in the Monona area.

Civilian response to active shooter trainings were conducted at three businesses in Monona, the Monona library, Monona Oaks Church, and Madison Pediatric Dental. This training provides people with ways to help keep safe and what they should do in case of an active shooter.

Attended a Law Enforcement Torch Run meeting for Special Olympics. The committee is searching for area departments in the region to assist with the torch run. Their goal is to have a representative from each Dane County Department to show support to the participants.

Helped the Monona Senior Center during their annual Christmas Lunch by serving beverages to the seniors.

School Officer Wunsch and I have continued with our “Lunch with a cop” program. The idea is for an officer to have lunch with students from grade schools and get to know them. We randomly pick days and will have sit down with the kids at the lunch table.

Current Investigations

MO17-09124 - PHYSICAL ABUSE CHILD

This was a case where a father was physically disciplining his child with an instrument which caused marks. We conducted a search warrant at the father’s residence in the 5100 block of Gordon Ave resulting in evidence recovery. A Safe Harbor interview was conducted where a trained forensic interviewer conducts a recorded interview with the child for use in court. Charges against the father were referred to the Dane County District Attorney’s Office.

NEIGHBORHOOD ELECTRIC VEHICLE

The electric vehicle shown to your right was recently purchased from the City of Verona. The electric vehicle is slated to be used by various City of Monona departments as needed. The vehicle was outfitted with a new wrap promoting sustainability.



WAL-MART DETAIL

Det. Sgt. Ryan Losby spent the better portion of one shift at Wal-Mart during the holiday shopping season. When staffing allows, the Monona Police Department likes to assign officers to the larger retail establishments for directed patrol. During the six-hour assignment there was one citation issued for Trespassing on a female that was officially banned from the store along with two subjects cited for Retail Theft.

MO17-09XXX - SEXUAL ASSAULT

This was a sexual assault allegation between family members that occurred many years ago. This investigation is pending and specific details of the case will not be disclosed.

MO17-09XXX - SEXUAL ASSAULT OF A CHILD

There was an allegation of an adult having sexual intercourse with a minor female in the 6300 block of Roselawn Ave. This case is awaiting evidence processing by the Wisconsin State Crime Lab. Family members reported the suspect in the case has moved back to Uruguay; his country of origin.

School Resource Officer

In the month of December, I handled 15 cases at the Monona Grove High School, 2 cases at MG21 and 0 cases at Winnequah Elementary School. I issued a citation for Underage Drinking, 3 Habitual Truancy citations, 1 referral to the DA's Office for Substantial Battery, and 3 Parking citations.

I conducted ALICE (active shooter principles) training with staff members from Cottage Grove Elementary, Taylor Prairie Elementary and the Monona Grove High School. I provided classroom instruction to 5 health classes at the high school on heroin and synthetic drugs. I also attended webinars on campus safety- fighting technology related crime and situational awareness and the OODA LOOP.

I coordinated K-9 sniffs at the Monona Grove High School and Glacial Drumlin Middle School.

A fight took place at MG21 between two female students. One student punched the other student in the face, causing her to hit her head on a locker. The student reportedly sustained a concussion. A single charge of Substantial Battery was referred to the DA's Office.

I received several reports of theft of money from unlocked lockers in the gym locker room. There are no suspects at this time.

After school on 12/22/17, an MGHS student sent a text message to his parents claiming to be suicidal. The student was located walking around in Monona, with the help of Dane County Sheriff Deputies. The student was turned over to the Deputies and they handled the disposition.

****Update**** One of the sexual assaults received through CPS last month actually took place in Fitchburg instead of Monona. The case was forwarded onto Fitchburg Police.

Five MGHS students went out to lunch and returned to school smelling of marijuana. Three of the five students admitting to smoking marijuana during the lunch period. The three students were given school consequences.

During the lunch hour, three students reported another student possibly being intoxicated at school. The student admitted to drinking the night before, but denied having any alcohol during school. The container he was drinking from tested positive for alcohol as did his breath. A preliminary breath test showed the student was at .067. The student was cited for Underage Drinking and received school consequences.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour and a half of the dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. In addition, Police staff must follow up by going to the DA's office to sign probable cause forms, as well as, review and electronically send and sign complaints to ensure the subjects are held on charges or charges are filed by the DA's Office.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers 911 and business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance issues. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of December, Dispatchers handled 1,073 calls for service. These calls were derived from calls on the 911 lines, non-emergency lines, personal reporting at the Police Department or directly from Monona Officers.

On September 6th the department went live on the Dane County TriTech CAD system. In the past a lot of our monthly statistics were derived from the Global CAD. We are still trying to get all the bugs worked out after making this transition, so there is no monthly summary report for December.
