OPERATIONS DIVISION

In June of 2019, the Operations Division handled 40 vehicle crashes and issued 167 traffic warnings, 255 traffic citations, and 23 parking tickets. Our calls total for June was 1,531 calls for service.

Training

Security Checks

Officers performed 124 security checks in the month of June. A security check is when an Officer goes into a business and walks around to meet with staff to discuss any problems that the businesses are aware of. This also serves as a deterrent for theft. For the overnight shift, this entails checking the perimeter of the business and pulling on doors to make sure the businesses are secure.

Retail Thefts

There were 42 retail theft cases in June, the same number as in May. Around 40 cases are typical in a month. These cases can be time consuming if the suspect flees and follow-up outside the City is necessary.

Tellurian Treatment Center

In June we had 11 calls to the Tellurian property totaling 10.5 hours of police time.

Use of Force Incidents

On June 5th, 2019 at 1:30 am, Monona Police Officers were watching suspicious vehicles at Wal-Mart. Upon one leaving a traffic stop was attempted but the vehicle accelerated to 100 MPH. The pursuit was terminated per policy. A Town of Madison Officer located the vehicle abandoned a short time later. A K9 track led to two people who were hiding in a backyard. One male was arrested for Felony Eluding and Possession of Drug Paraphernalia and turned out to have a warrant due to being an escaped inmate. (MO19-07228)

On June 10th, 2019 at 8:43 am an Officer was flagged down by a motorist who stated someone just struck their car and was fleeing. The victim pointed out the suspect car. The Officer attempted to make a traffic stop but the vehicle took the shoulder and was quite far ahead. The Officer was about to terminate the stop when he observed the vehicle in a second crash. The male was held at gun point until backup could arrive. The crashes both took place in Madison and they took over this investigation. (MO19-07476)

On June 11th, 2019 at 1:34 am, Monona Police Officers were dispatched to Wal-Mart for a suspicious vehicle. A traffic violation occurred and a traffic stop was attempted but the juvenile driver rapidly accelerated and the pursuit was terminated per policy. Surveillance video led to the identification of the parties involved and the vehicle had been stolen. Charges were referred to the DA's Office. (MO19-07517)

On June 18th, 2019 at 1:46 am, Monona Police Officers were dispatched to Wal-Mart in the City of Monona for a report of two possible stolen vehicles in the underground parking lot. Upon being approached the operator of the SUV accelerated rapidly towards two fully uniformed Officers almost striking one of the Officers. This vehicle was also suspected of being involved in an armed robbery and shots fired call the day prior. Monona Officers, along with the Dane County Sheriff's Department, pursued this vehicle. Numerous area departments assisted with deploying spike strips in an attempt to safely end the pursuit. There was a successful deployment of spikes and the vehicle stopped. The suspects from the vehicle fled on foot. Another vehicle came to the area and picked up the fleeing suspects. A second pursuit ensued, that vehicle was also stopped using spikes, and the occupants were detained. Two adult females were booked into the Dane County Jail on charges of Knowingly Fleeing an Officer and Resisting an Officer. (MO19-07840)

On June 20th, 2019 at 1:20 am an Officer attempted to stop a vehicle for speeding 83 MPH in a 55 MPH zone. As the Officer activated his emergency lights, the car sped away at speeds in excess of 105 MPH. The pursuit was then terminated per policy. (MO19-07935)

On June 22nd, 2019 at 3:52 am an Officer attempted to stop a vehicle believed to be a stolen black Lexus SUV from Madison. The vehicle immediately accelerated away from the Officer onto the beltline and the Officer terminated the pursuit per policy. (MO19-08067)

Citizen Complaints

There were no citizen complaints in June.

1st Shift Monthly Report

On June 12th, 2019, at 12:56 pm, an Officer was driving southbound on Monona Drive in the median side lane, when a car in the outside lane made an abrupt turn into the median lane, striking the squad car. It turned out the couple in the car were trying to find a local business and were listening to a GPS giving directions. When it said to make a U-turn, the driver proceeded to, and didn't see the squad next to them. The minor damage was repaired by the vehicle owner's insurance. (MO19-07577)



On June 27th, 2019, at 6:41 am, an Officer was dispatched to a Monona residence for a report of a burglary to their garage. Sometime overnight someone entered the garage and stole a purse out of one of the cars, and also stole two very distinctive, very expensive bicycles. Two days later, Officers were called for a bicycle that was being walked down the roadway by a male in his underwear, who they know lives nearby, but they have never seen with a bicycle, much less this distinctive very expensive looking bicycle. It turned out this male had broken into the garage and taken the bicycles. He stated he saw them in the garage on an earlier date and made an impulsive decision to take the bicycles. The stolen purse was also located. (MO19-08311)

2nd Shift

Here is the second shift activity report for the month of June 2019. Officers conducted 129 traffic stops, handled 20 Retail Thefts, and 25 crashes. We also made 1 OWI arrest.

The following are some of the cases second shift handled this month.

On June 6th Officers were dispatched to Wal-Mart in the City of Monona for a disturbance at the Customer Service Counter. Officers arrived and made contact with a male subject who was very upset he couldn't return a pair of boots. The subject did not have his receipt for the purchase. It turned out the boots were not the same boots as the box they were in and that a check of the computer system showed that the boots that were supposed to be in that box were never sold around the day the subject claimed he purchased them. The subject then left without action needed.

On June 4th Officers responded to Summit Credit Union for a disturbance. A caller stated that it appeared two men were about to fight. Upon arrival one of the suspects had fled. Officers made contact with the other subject. That person advised that the man who left had road rage issues. Apparently that subject had cut off the other man twice. When he pulled into the lot of Summit the suspect exited his vehicle and the two men exchanged words.

On June 11th Officers were sent to Speedway South for a disturbance. During the investigation Officers learned that the argument was over one vehicle apparently cutting the other vehicle off. When both vehicles pulled into the lot of Speedway an argument took place. During this argument racial slurs were exchanged and one of the subjects got his dog out of the vehicle. The Officers were told that the dog was vicious and the owner was telling it to sic 'em. The dog was on a leash and never bit anyone. Multiple people were cited and released from this incident.

3rd Shift

The Monona Police Department third shift officers handled 13 retail thefts, 5 business alarms and responded to several disturbance calls during the month of June. Officers made 151 traffic stops resulting in 7 OWI arrests. Of those 151 traffic stops, 103 were given warnings, while 48 were issued citations.

On June 2nd, 2019 at 2:41 a.m. a vehicle was stopped for unsafe lane deviation. The operator was arrested for OWI 3rd, offense, with a B.A.C. of .17 g/210L. The operator was taken to the Dane County Jail on a probation violation.

On June 6th, 2019 at 1:38 a.m. an officer attempted to stop a vehicle on HWY 12 at South Towne Drive after observing suspicious behavior that occurred on Royal Avenue. The vehicle fled from the officer who terminated the vehicle pursuit. The suspect vehicle was found abandoned by the Town of Madison. A K9 track was conducted from the suspect vehicle which led to the apprehension of two suspects. The driver was identified and taken to Jail on eluding an officer and several arrest warrants.

On June 9th, 2019 at 5:06 a.m. an officer stopped out with a disabled vehicle at Denny's Restaurant. During the investigation officers observed suspicious behavior and requested a K9 to respond. The K9 alerted to the vehicle and a search was conducted which resulted in 21 individual packaged baggies of heroin, with a total weight of 14.8 grams. Also seized was \$1800 in U.S. currency. The driver was arrested and taken to the Dane County Jail on delivery of heroin charges and an active arrest warrant.

On June 11th, 2019 at 1:38 a.m. Wal-Mart Loss Prevention called in a suspicious vehicle. When officers attempted contact with the vehicle it fled westbound on HWY 12. Officers terminated their pursuit and the vehicle was later reported stolen through the City of Madison. After reviewing store surveillance video the suspects have been identified and arrested for eluding.

On June 18th, 2019 at 1:46 a.m. Wal-Mart, loss prevention was reporting a couple vehicles that could be stolen in the underground parking lot. Responding officers arrived on scene and observed one vehicle attempting to flee. Officers attempted contact and the vehicle almost struck an officer while fleeing. A vehicle pursuit engaged and was joined by multiple Dane County agencies. During the pursuit another Monona officer was attempting contact with another group of individuals who were suspected to be in the stolen auto prior to arriving to Wal-Mart. When this officer was exiting his patrol car he heard two gunshots coming from the suspects as they were running north. Officers in the pursuit had lost the stolen auto but later found it abandoned. A K9 track was conducted when they came across a suspicious vehicle. Another vehicle pursuit was started with this car. After tire deflation devices were struck by the suspect vehicle it came to a stop in Fitchburg. These suspects were apprehended. The investigation in the case is still ongoing.

On June 25th, 2019 at 4:26 a.m. Wal-Mart reported a high dollar amount Retail Theft in progress. While responding officers were enroute Loss Prevention stated that the suspect was headed toward the Tire Center Exit, where there appeared to be a getaway vehicle parked. Officers blocked the getaway vehicle in and made contact with its occupants. While in contact with the vehicle dispatch informed officers that the vehicle was listed as stolen through the City of Madison. The driver of this vehicle was arrested. During this the retail theft suspect fled as they had seen officers. A Capital PD officer located the suspect running and he was arrested. The suspects were taken into custody and charged with their crimes. As a result of the investigation officers were also able to locate stolen property that was stolen in a burglary that occurred in the City of Madison.

Members of the Investigative Unit were assigned to, or assisted with, the investigation of 18 current and past incidents.

Current Investigations

MO19-06086 - BURGLARY

On 06-27-19 it was reported that there was a residential burglary to the garage of a residence. Two bikes valued at approximately \$28,000.00 were taken overnight. The owner put descriptions of the bikes on social media. A witness observed someone trying to get rid of the bikes in a nearby neighborhood early the following morning. The witness did not know the subject but knew where he resided. We tracked him down and he subsequently admitted to committing the burglary. He was taken to jail on two felony counts and the bikes were recovered, along with a purse.

MO19-06517 – INJURY CRASH

Detectives assisted with an injury crash after the fact by obtaining warrants for multiple different pieces of evidence to help determine if there will be any criminal liability.

MO19-07046 - THEFT

Officers took a report of a theft of keys from a locker room at a local gym. Detectives followed up by obtaining video of the suspect and obtaining a possible suspect. Charges are unknown at this point.

MO19-07517 – ELUDING/STOLEN VEHICLE

Officers responded to a local business for a suspicious vehicle. An Officer made contact with the vehicle which then fled. The Officer engaged in a pursuit with the vehicle and terminated the pursuit. Wal-Mart provided pictures of the suspects. Detectives were able to identify both suspects. Detectives made contact with the owner of the vehicle who did not realize his vehicle had been stolen until we contacted him. He filed a stolen vehicle report with MPD. The driver of the vehicle was charged with driving a stolen car and eluding police.

MO19-07840 – ELUDING/STOLEN VEHICLE

Patrol engaged in two pursuits with two separate vehicles. Detectives drafted and executed a search warrant to search multiple phones seized from both vehicles. This, along with other investigative techniques, led to multiple suspects being identified and criminal charges issued against multiple juveniles and adults.

Student A did not stop and student B slapped student A several times and began yelling. Both students received school consequences as well as Disorderly Conduct citations.

Over the summer, I will transition back to patrol duties. Monthly reports will begin again in September 2019.

Citation and Arrest Statistics

During the month of June, the Monona Police issued numerous traffic citations, municipal ordinance (non-traffic) citations, parking citations and warnings. In addition, there were many referrals for charges. See the detail below.

Each of the adult and juvenile arrests and referrals take at least an hour and a half of the dispatchers' time to complete the reports and intake paperwork for the Dane County District Attorney's Office. In addition, Police staff must follow up by going to the DA's office to sign probable cause forms, as well as, review and electronically sign complaints to ensure the subjects are properly charged or held on charges.

Dispatch

The Monona Communications Center answers business line calls for Police, Fire, and EMS incidents. Calls for service for Fire and EMS are transferred to the Dane County Communications Center for dispatching of Monona Fire and EMS personnel. The Monona Communications Center advises Police of high priority Fire and EMS calls in the event Officer Response is required. Many of the business line calls include routine phone calls from citizens who are not only seeking police assistance, but also assistance with processing citation payments, requesting police records and general assistance. The dispatchers are also responsible for preparing and filing officer reports, citations, accidents, parking, UCR reporting and many other routine daily duties.

During the month of June, Dispatchers handled 1,531 calls for service. Most of these calls for service were received on the non-emergency lines, via personal reporting at the Police Department, transfers from the Dane County Communications Center or as self-initiated calls directly from Monona Officers.

Community Resource Officer

During the month of June, Community Resource Officer Reiter was involved in the following crime prevention, community relations activities, or other work related activities:

Pick N Save held their annual Stuff the Squad event. Customers purchase a pre-load bag of groceries and then place it into a squad car. The items inside the bags are then donated to St. Stevens Food Pantry.



Completed the building assessment for 200 River Place and provided Smart Solutions with a safety report for improving safety in their building.

I attended an Elder Abuse meeting in Madison. The meeting focused on abuse later in life and a documentary of a victim and what she went through during her time being abused.

I participated in the Summer Library Kickoff event for children and their families. A booth was set up with different police equipment and materials for kids to look at. We also had a finger print identification station set up for kids to examine their own finger prints.

I presented at the Monona Frostwoods Apartments Stepping On. The presentation was about safety when out and about.

I presented a short talk at Walmart to their employees about situational awareness. The talk provided their employees with tips on what to look out for, what to do if they see something, and when to react.

I presented at two different bike camps at the Monona Community Center. The presentations were on bike safety.

Coffee with a Cop took place at the Monona Senior Center. Several questions were asked related to theft, vehicle theft, and safety. Normally the event goes for about 30 minutes, this event lasted 90 minutes.
